Acting President and Program Chairman, Bobby Brock, introduced Oreda Chin, Executive Director of Between Women, Inc. Oreda hails from Detroit and is a retired phone company executive at Michigan Bell. Oreda also has an extensive background in community outreach programs and has worked for San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce, Newbreak Church, American Red Cross, and her own business, Chinupbiz, a small business development company. Oreda regularly volunteers at the Brawley Chamber of Commerce and has recently become a Brawley Kiwanis Club member.

Between Women, Inc. is a non-profit organization that has been providing services in our Valley for nearly 20 years. The organization was founded in 1997 by Linda Cady, and its mission is to help women in the Imperial County live longer through education, advocacy, and early detection of breast cancer.

Between Women, Inc. educates women and their families about breast cancer, and provides access to mammograms and mastectomy products. Additionally, Between Women, Inc. provides prosthetic devices, hats, scarves, wigs, jewelry, pillows, and quilts to support and uplift cancer survivors.

Between Women, Inc. is located behind Pioneers Memorial Hospital in Brawley, CA. The organization relies on grants, donations, and fundraisers for their operational budget. Bill Plourd spoke briefly about the good work done by Between Women, Inc. and generously donated \$1,000 to the organization.


